MANUFACTURERS SALES TAX EXEMPTION FOR ENERGY USAGE

HB 1624 by Rep. David Dunn would provide a sales tax exemption for all fuel and energy used by businesses in the manufacturing process. PLEASE CONTINUE TO MAKE CONTACT WITH YOUR STATE LEGISLATORS AND ENCOURAGE THEM TO SUPPORT A REDUCTION IN THE SALES TAXES PAID BY MANUFACTURERS ON THEIR ENERGY COSTS.

SESSION EXTENSION

HCR 1012 by Rep. Robert Moore would extend the session until April 10. It has passed the House and must now be voted on by the Senate. It is on today's Senate calendar.

SCRAP METAL

HB 1479 by Rep. Darrin Williams received a Do Pass as amended from the Senate Judiciary Committee last week and is on today's Senate Calendar. HB 1479 would create a Class D felony for the offense of damaging wires and other fixtures of telephone, cable and electric power companies or any line that could result in physical injury. It also adds new restrictions and requirements on scrap metal dealers. This is an agreed bill by the parties in interest. The State Chamber/AIA supports this bill.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

HB 1279 by Rep. Keith Ingram would authorize the Workforce Services Department to disclose certain information about employers that are classified in the Standard Industrial Classification Code to the Environmental Quality Department. This bill is one of three that have been agreed to between management and labor. It is on today's Senate Calendar.

HB 1478 by Rep. Mike Patterson and **SB 429** by Sen. Tracy Steele are the other bills that are part of the agreed to package between the AFL-CIO and the State Chamber/AIA. Both bills are being amended. HB 1478 would authorize certain information to be shared between the Department of Workforce Services (DWS) and the Department of Finance and Administration. SB 429 addresses the fact that the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund will run out of money in the immediate future.

Today is the last day to file appropriations bills. The deadline for regular bill filings is Monday, March 9.

<u>HB 1682</u>	<u>Maloch</u>	Provides that claims for damages caused by the unauthorized practice of law are not subject to provisions of the Deceptive Trade Practices Act.
<u>HB 1683</u>	<u>Barnett</u>	Creates the Regional Mobility Fund to distribute money to Regional Mobility Authorities that register with the State Treasurer.
<u>HB 1684</u>	<u>Barnett</u>	Creates the Regional Mobility Grant Program to be administered by the State Highway Commission and provide grants for operating expenses, studies and development of regional transportation projects.
<u>HB 1686</u>	<u>Everett</u>	Creates an income tax credit of 5 percent of the amount of overtime wages that a utility worker performed in a county that was declared a state disaster area, limiting the credit to \$400 and providing that the credit may not be carried forward.
<u>HB 1696</u>	<u>Dismang</u>	Creates an income tax credit of 10 percent of the amount paid by an employer for insurance premiums on employee health benefit plans and sets the maximum credit allowed at \$15,000.
<u>HB 1703</u>	<u>Shelby</u>	Applies the Patient Protection Act of 1995 to a health care provider network utilized by a self-funded health benefit plan provided by the state to state employees and public school personnel.
<u>HB 1705</u>	<u>Reep</u>	Authorizes planning and development districts to apply with a municipality for designation as a public corporation for one or more projects.
<u>HB 1712</u>	<u>Williams</u>	Authorizes the Public Service Commission to issue financing orders that allow electric utilities to securitize storm recovery costs if the commission finds that the issuance of the storm recovery bonds are expected to lower recovery cost.
<u>SB 608</u>	<u>Broadway</u>	Authorizes improvement districts using county collectors for collection of district dues to assess a levy against all existing parcels on the tax books for the year; prescribes procedures required of districts and county clerks and treasurers.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

HB 1362, the agreed workers' compensation bill between the State Chamber/AIA and the AFL-CIO, is on the Senate Insurance and Commerce Committee agenda. However, it likely will not be heard until the committee's completes the consideration of the PBM bill, SB 460.

POPULAR VOTE FOR U.S. PRESIDENT

HB 1339 by Rep. Eddie Cooper and Sen. Terry Smith is on tomorrow's Senate State Agencies Committee agenda. This bill would require Arkansas's delegation of presidential electors in a presidential election to be appointed based on the nationwide popular vote total, rather than the popular vote in Arkansas. We believe that the loss of the electoral voting system would greatly reduce Arkansas's impact on electing the President of the United States. The State Chamber/AIA opposes this bill.

PHARMACY BENEFIT MANAGEMENT (PBM)

SB 460 by Sen. Percy Malone and **HB 1601** by Rep. Allen Maxwell are identical bills that require entities that are managers of pharmacy benefits plans for insurers, employers and certain other health care entities or health plans to itemize individual claims, disclosing the amount paid to a pharmacist, the identity of the pharmacist and the

prescription number when the PBM seeks reimbursement or payment for services provided by the pharmacists. It also provides that a violation constitutes a deceptive and unconscionable trade practice under the Deceptive Trade Practices Act.

SB 460 was presented last week in the Senate Insurance and Commerce Committee, but the committee ran out of time and did not vote on the bill. Consideration of the bill will continue this week. HB 1601 is on the House Insurance and Commerce Committee's agenda.

EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT

HJR 1014 by Rep. Lindsley Smith and **SJR 12** by Sen. Sue Madison would ratify the proposed amendment to the United States Constitution guaranteeing equality of rights to women and authorize Congress to enforce by legislation those provisions. There is a debate over whether the time has passed to adopt ERA at the federal level. It is our understanding at this time that this is subject to legal interpretation. We are also curious about potential applications in the workplace. HJR 1014 awaits consideration in the House State Agencies and Governmental Affairs Committee and SJR 12 is on tomorrow's agenda in the Senate State Agencies and Governmental Affairs Committee.

WORKPLACE

HB 1552 by Rep. Lindsley Smith provides that employers shall provide unpaid break time each day to employees who need to express breast milk for her child in order to maintain milk supply, and to make a reasonable effort to provide a private and sanitary room for her to do so. This bill is on tomorrow's House Public Health, Welfare & Labor Committee agenda.

GRADUATED DRIVERS LICENSES

SB 309 by Sen. J. Jeffress and Rep. Shelby is scheduled for a Special Order of Business in the House Public Transportation Committee tomorrow morning. It would prohibit the use of a cellular phone or other interactive device while operating a motor vehicle by a driver with a learners' driver's license or intermediate driver's license. It would also place restrictions on driving hours for those with intermediate driver's licenses unless accompanied by licensed driver who is at least 21 years old or driving to or from school or church-related activity or job or due to an emergency and would restrict passengers to not more than one unrelated passenger unless accompanied by license driver who is at least 21 years old and in the front passenger seat. Motor vehicle crashes were the leading cause of death for teens from 1999 to 2005, causing 78 percent of all Arkansas teen fatalities during that time period. Studies estimate a crash reduction of 20 to 30 percent in states with strong graduated drivers' licensing laws. The State Chamber/AIA supports this provision to reduce trauma in Arkansas.

CLIMATE CHANGE LEGISLATION

SB 584 by Sen. Shane Broadway authorizes the Development Finance Authority to issue the Energy Cost Savings Projects General Obligation Bonds, not to exceed \$300,000,000, to finance energy cost savings contracts by state agencies for improvements to state buildings. It has been assigned to the Senate Insurance and Commerce Committee.

HB 1677 by Rep. Joan Cash directs the Public Service Commission to establish energy efficiency resource standards that require the procurement of efficiency resources by public utilities regulated by the commission. It is on today's House Calendar for withdrawal from further consideration.

HB 1663 by Rep. Kathy Webb would provide for the building and renovation of buildings owned by the state or institutions of higher education through sustainable, energy efficient methods. It has been assigned to the Joint Energy Committee.

SSTP

SB 322 by Sen. Larry Teague passed the Senate last week and has been referred to the House Revenue and Tax Committee. The bill amends sales tax provisions to be consistent with the Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Agreement and provides that sales tax is levied on the withdrawal of goods from the stock of an established business.

MINIMUM WAGE

HB 1464 by Rep. Jim Nickels passed the House earlier this week and has been referred to the Senate Public Health, Welfare and Labor Committee. This bill would make Arkansas's minimum wage law match the federal government. The State Chamber/AIA does not have a position on this bill.

FOOD TAX

SB 88 by Sen. Bobby Glover would reduce the sales tax on food and food ingredients by 1%. This is a priority item for Governor Beebe. The bill remains on the House Revenue and Taxation Committee agenda.

TRAUMA SYSTEM

SB 315 by Sen. Tracy Steele and Rep. Gene Shelby is the legislation to set up a statewide trauma system. The bill would authorize the Department of Health to grant funds to emergency medical care providers, ambulance providers, trauma rehabilitation service, and to hospitals to assist qualification as trauma centers; to create a communication network; and more. It passed the Senate last week and has been referred to the House Committee on Public Health, Welfare and Labor.

YESTERDAY AT THE CAPITOL

CLIMATE CHANGE LEGISLATION

A group of legislators held a press conference yesterday to announce a package of bills that will be filed soon. This announcement follows the Global Warming Commission's report that was released last fall. We see three bills were filed yesterday:

SB 584 by Sen. Shane Broadway authorizes the Development Finance Authority to issue the Energy Cost Savings Projects General Obligation Bonds, not to exceed \$300,000,000, to finance energy cost savings contracts by state agencies for improvements to state buildings. It has been assigned to the Senate Insurance and Commerce Committee.

HB 1677 by Rep. Joan Cash directs the Public Service Commission to establish energy efficiency resource standards that require the procurement of efficiency resources by public utilities regulated by the commission. It has been assigned to the House Insurance and Commerce Committee.

HB 1663 by Rep. Kathy Webb would provide for the building and renovation of buildings owned by the state or institutions of higher education through sustainable, energy efficient methods. It has been assigned to the Joint Energy Committee.

SSTP

SB 322 by Sen. Larry Teague passed the Senate yesterday by a vote of 27-2 and has been referred to the House Revenue and Tax Committee. The bill amends sales tax provisions to be consistent with the Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Agreement and provides that sales tax is levied on the withdrawal of goods from the stock of an established business.

TRAUMA SYSTEM

SB 315 by Sen. Tracy Steele and Rep. Gene Shelby is the legislation to set up a statewide trauma system. The bill would authorize the Department of Health to grant funds to emergency medical care providers, ambulance providers, trauma rehabilitation service, and to hospitals to assist qualification as trauma centers; to create a communication network; and more. It passed the Senate by a vote of 32-0 yesterday and has been referred to the House Committee on Public Health, Welfare and Labor.

SEAT BELT LAWS

SB 78 by Sen. Wilkins and Rep. Allen passed the house Wednesday but the emergency clause failed. Yesterday, House members voted to reconsider the emergency clause and it passed by a vote of 94-2. The bill will now go to the Governor for his signature. SB 78 would repeal ACA 27-37- 704, which prohibited vehicle stops solely to determine compliance with seat belt laws. The bill would forbid the suspension or revocation of a driver's license based on violation of seat belt laws. In 2006, approximately five out of every 1,000 belted drivers were hospitalized in Arkansas after a traffic crash compared with 56 out of every 1,000 unbelted drivers. These crash-related hospitalization charges were almost \$174,000 for every 1,000 belted drivers in a crash compared with more than \$2.7 million for every 1,000 unbelted drivers. The State Chamber/AIA supports this provision to reduce trauma in Arkansas.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

HB 1478 by Rep. Mike Patterson would authorize certain information to be shared between the Department of Workforce Services (DWS) and the Department of Finance and Administration. It is on the agenda in the House Revenue and Taxation Committee.

SB 429 by Sen. Tracy Steele addresses the fact that the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund will run out of money in the immediate future and require the state to borrow money from the federal government. Knowing that this circumstance would occur, the State Chamber/AIA Unemployment Insurance Committee and the State Chamber/AIA Executive Committee authorized our agreement to allow an increase in the taxable wage base. We asked labor for some concessions that originally they would not accept.

The Legislative Sub-committee of the ESD Advisory Council met yesterday afternoon to discuss HB 1478 and SB 429. Following a thorough discussion, the State Chamber/AIA and the AFL-CIO, who each hold five positions along with three consumer representatives on the ESD Advisory Council, agreed to support both bills after amendments are made to each bill. The most notable change will be to increase the taxable wage base from \$10,000 to \$11,000 effective January 1, 2010, and labor agreed to the change in quits and discharges which will also help with the trust fund.

You are probably seeing reports in the news that some states are considering and/or rejecting the federal stimulus dollars related to unemployment insurance. We are aware of this, have obtained detailed information from Washington, reviewed the information with our Unemployment Insurance Committee leadership, and expressed our concerns to the Department of Workforce Services staff and to the Governor's office.

SSTP

SB 322 by Sen. Larry Teague received a Do Pass from the Senate Revenue and Tax Committee yesterday. It is on today's Senate Calendar. The bill amends sales tax provisions to be consistent with the Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Agreement and provides that sales tax is levied on the withdrawal of goods from the stock of an established business.

SCRAP METAL

HB 1479 by Rep. Darrin Williams received a Do Pass as amended from the Senate Judiciary Committee yesterday. The amendment simply adds Senate sponsors. HB 1479 would create a Class D felony for the offense of damaging wires and other fixtures of telephone, cable and electric power companies or any line that could result in physical injury. It also adds new restrictions and requirements on scrap metal dealers. This is an agreed bill by the parties in interest. The State Chamber/AIA supports this bill.

TRAUMA SYSTEM

SB 315 by Sen. Tracy Steele and Rep. Gene Shelby is the legislation to set up a statewide trauma system. The bill, which received a Do Pass as Amended from the Senate Public Health, Welfare and Labor Committee yesterday, would authorize the Department of Health to grant funds to emergency medical care providers, ambulance providers, trauma rehabilitation service, and to hospitals to assist qualification as trauma centers; to create a communication network; and more. It will now go before the full Senate for consideration.

According to an article by Rob Moritz of the Arkansas News Bureau, the current plan is for there to be two or three Level 1 trauma centers in the state, 10 Level 2 centers, 17 Level 3 centers and as many as 54 Level 4 centers. Arkansas's Level 1 trauma centers will all be located in Little Rock so Level 1 trauma centers in Memphis, TN, Shreveport, LA and Springfield, MO would continue to service Arkansas patients that are within an hour drive of those facilities. LOTTERY

The House Rules and Senate State Agencies Committees met upon adjournment yesterday to discuss the scholarship portion of legislation related to the lottery amendment. The legislation is still in draft form, but plans are for lottery proceeds to be directed into the existing Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship. Students with a 2.5 GPA and a 19 or higher on the ACT would qualify for a scholarship regardless of household income. Monies would also be available to non-traditional students. No one knows exactly how much the lottery will generate so the plan does not establish scholarship amounts, but rather establishes a scale based upon lottery revenues. Legislators hope to be able to provide the first lottery-funded scholarships in the fall of 2010. Rep. SEAT BELT AND GRADUATED DRIVERS LICENSE LAWS

SB 78 by Sen. Wilkins and Rep. Allen passed the house yesterday by a vote of 60-30 but the emergency clause failed 64-28. The House may vote on the emergency clause again if they can gain enough support to pass it, otherwise the bill

will go to the Governor's desk for his signature without the emergency clause enacted. SB 78 would repeal ACA 27-37- 704, which prohibited vehicle stops solely to determine compliance with seat belt laws. The bill would forbid the suspension or revocation of a driver's license based on violation of seat belt laws. In 2006, approximately five out of every 1,000 belted drivers were hospitalized in Arkansas after a traffic crash compared with 56 out of every 1,000 unbelted drivers. These crash-related hospitalization charges were almost \$174,000 for every 1,000 belted drivers in a crash compared with more than \$2.7 million for every 1,000 unbelted drivers.

SB 309 by Sen. J. Jeffress and Rep. Shelby is scheduled for a Special Order of Business in the House Public Transportation Committee on Tuesday, March 3. It would prohibit the use of a cellular phone or other interactive device while operating a motor vehicle by a driver with a learners' driver's license or intermediate driver's license. It would also place restrictions on driving hours for those with intermediate driver's licenses unless accompanied by licensed driver who is at least 21 years old or driving to or from school or church-related activity or job or due to an emergency and would restrict passengers to not more than one unrelated passenger unless accompanied by license driver who is at least 21 years old and in the front passenger seat. Motor vehicle crashes were the leading cause of death for teens from 1999 to 2005, causing 78 percent of all Arkansas teen fatalities during that time period. Studies estimate a crash reduction of 20 to 30 percent in states with strong graduated drivers' licensing laws.

The State Chamber/AIA has policy in support of these provisions to reduce trauma in Arkansas.

MINIMUM WAGE

HB 1464 by Rep. Jim Nickels passed the House yesterday by a vote of 67 to 27 and has been referred to the Senate Public Health, Welfare and Labor Committee. This bill would make Arkansas's minimum wage law match the federal government. The State Chamber/AIA does not have a position on this bill.

PHARMACY BENEFIT MANAGEMENT (PBM)

HB 1601 by Rep. Allen Maxwell and **SB 460** by Sen. Percy Malone are identical bills that require entities that are managers of pharmacy benefits plans for insurers, employers and certain other health care entities or health plans to itemize individual claims, disclosing the amount paid to a pharmacist, the identity of the pharmacist and the prescription number when the PBM seeks reimbursement or payment for services provided by the pharmacists. It also provides that a violation constitutes a deceptive and unconscionable trade practice under the Deceptive Trade Practices Act. SB 460 is on tomorrow's agenda in the Senate Insurance and Commerce Committee.

EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT

HJR 1014 by Rep. Lindsley Smith and **SJR 12** by Sen. Sue Madison would ratify the proposed amendment to the United States Constitution guaranteeing equality of rights to women and authorizing Congress to enforce by legislation those provisions. It requires the Secretary of State to provide Archivist of the U.S. with a copy of the resolution and provides that copies be given to Arkansas's U.S. Senators, U.S. House of Representatives, Vice President of the United States and Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives.

Mike Patterson would authorize certain information to be shared between the Department of Workforce Services (DWS) and the Department of Finance and Administration. **SB 429** by Sen. Tracy Steele is a significant bill filed by the Department of Workforce Services that addresses a very serious situation regarding the rapidly declining balance in the trust fund that pays unemployment insurance claims.

The State Chamber/AIA and the AFL-CIO each hold five positions on the ESD Advisory Council along with three consumer representatives. The Council meets on a quarterly basis and makes recommendations to DWS regarding unemployment insurance (UI) legislation. Every year since 1965, labor and management have reached an agreement and jointly supported UI legislation. To date, an agreement has not been met but a specially called meeting of the ESD Advisory Council will be held this week to address HB 1478 and SB 429.

LOTTERY

Now that the tobacco tax has been signed into law, the next big issue under consideration by the legislature is the implementation of the state lottery approved in the November election. Leadership in the House and Senate appointed study groups to make recommendations and reports from these groups surfaced this week. Yesterday, a rare joint

meeting of the House and Senate Rules Committees and State Agencies & Governmental Affairs Committees was held to discuss the lottery issues.

The *Arkansas News Bureau* is reporting that a group of state lawmakers released a draft bill yesterday, which did not include rules for the awarding of scholarships. In the story [here](#), they quote the lead sponsor of the legislation, House Speaker Robbie Wills, D-Conway, who said lawmakers are working on a plan to create a sliding scale in which the amount of scholarship money awarded would depend on the amount of money the lottery collects. “The last thing we want to do is promise more than we can deliver,” Wills said at a meeting of the Political Animals Club of Northwest Arkansas held at the Governor’s Mansion.

The story also quotes Sen. Terry Smith, D-Hot Springs, who said day-to-day operations of the lottery would be under the control of a nine-member commission that would operate like a private business. “We have tried to design this, and I think we’ve accomplished that, so they can change with market conditions and make changes quickly,” Smith said.

The *Arkansas News* story also reports that three members of the commission would be appointed by the governor, three by the House speaker and three by the Senate president pro tem, according to the draft bill. The committee would be overseen by a new legislative committee, the Arkansas Lottery Commission Legislative Oversight Committee, but Wills said the Legislature would not have any influence in decisions such as selecting vendors. Commission members and lottery employees would be prohibited from receiving a gift of any value from a lottery vendor. They also could not engage in lobbying on any lottery-related issue for a period of two years after they quit. The commission would be subject to the Arkansas Freedom of Information Act. Video lottery terminals would not be allowed, but the draft bill would allow scratch-off games, draw games and multi-state games. Knowingly selling a lottery ticket to a person under 18 would be a Class A misdemeanor.

We met yesterday morning with a group of legislators, labor representatives, state officials and home builders to discuss the intent of our bill. It appears the primary holdup on our agreed bill was concern by a group of legislators over a bill that passed two years ago. We believe we cleared up all of the concerns. **Please encourage your legislators to honor the workers' comp agreement between management and labor and pass HB 1362 as soon as possible.**

IMMIGRATION

HB 1383 by Rep. Jim Nickels would authorize the Contractors Licensing Board to, after notice and hearing, impose civil penalties up to \$200 per day and suspend or revoke a contractor's certificate of license for knowingly employing illegal immigrants. The Board and the various contractors' associations are opposed. This bill will likely be considered in the House State Agencies and Governmental Affairs Committee this morning.

Yesterday, the bill was re-referred to committee. Essentially, this bill would allow the President of the United States to be elected by a popular vote. YESTERDAY AT THE CAPITOL

HIGHWAYS

SB 104 by Sen. Bobby Glover passed the House yesterday by a vote of 95-1 and will now go to Governor Beebe for his signature. It would extend the State Highway Commission's window of time to issue bonds for interstate improvement from the end of 2013 to the end of 2015. The State Chamber/AIA supported the original interstate bond program in 1999 and its renewal in 2007.

LOTTERY

Yesterday, members of the General Assembly were given a report by the select group of legislators that have been working behind the scenes on the legislative issues related to the lottery. Rep. Steve Harrelson reports on his blog, www.underthedome.com that a bill is expected by Friday. Here is a summary of the recommendations from Rep. Harrelson:

A few highlights of the scholarship component:

- A new scholarship would be created temporarily named the "Arkansas Opportunity Scholarship." Eligibility: (1) Graduate from high school with a 2.5 GPA, (2) score 19 on the ACT or (3) earn a 2.5 GPA after completing 12 semester hours at a two year or four-year college.
- Initial scholarship awards would be at least \$1,500 per year at a four-year school and \$750 per year at a two-year school.
- The scholarship could be renewed for up to 130 attempted semester hours if the recipient maintains a 2.5 grade-point average.
- A Smart Core Incentive will provide \$500 beyond the Opportunity Scholarship.
- A Transfer Scholarship of \$2,500 each year will be created for recipients who complete an associate degree and go on to a four-year degree program.
- A STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) Grant will be created for applicants who are admitted to a higher education program in a high-demand science, technology, engineering and mathematics field, which will be determined by the governor's Workforce Cabinet. Eligibility requirements would include a 2.75 GPA to receive and keep a grant. We would also expand GO, CHALLENGE, and other existing scholarship programs.

Highlights of the governing component:

- A nine-member lottery commission would establish and oversee the lottery.
- The commission would appoint a director for the lottery's daily operations.
- A Lottery Scholarship Division would be created within the Dept of Higher Ed and would develop the rules, determine eligibility and determine the amount of the scholarship and grant awards.
- The legislation would bar a lottery vendor from making political contributions or gifts to a public official and commission members or employees.
- The commission would provide compensation to lottery retailers of at least 5 percent of gross sales, the memo said.

- Unclaimed winnings (up to \$200,000) will go in a fund to help with gambling addiction.
- A reserve fund of up to \$50 million will fund scholarships in the event the bottom falls out of the economy or if ticket sales fall to zero.
- If you win the lottery, any child support arrears, tax liens or judgments will come off the top.
- Casino-style gambling and video lotteries would be explicitly prohibited under the legislation.

It has been assigned to the House Insurance and Commerce Committee, where it is expected to be heard on Friday morning. There will be an amendment to the bill to add Rep. Rick Green and Senators Jerry Taylor and Joyce Elliott as co-sponsors. The amendment will also fix some typographical errors and add a code cross reference.

We worked with leaders of labor most of the day yesterday to get control of the other bills filed to date that impact workers' compensation.

Sen. Joyce Elliott told the AFL-CIO president and the State Chamber/AIA Executive Vice President that she would not run **SB 237** if the AFL-CIO could not convince the firefighters union to withdraw the bill.

We are going to assist Rep. Garry Smith by providing information to his constituent with the hope of Rep. Smith not having to run **HB 1187**.

We worked with leaders of the Municipal League and Rep. Tommy Baker yesterday about **HB 1314**. This bill does not make a substantive change in workers' comp laws, but it is a workers' comp bill and if we are going to effectively negotiate with labor we must honor that process. We told the Municipal League president that we would put this bill in the negotiation process for 2011 and should have no problems helping them pass the bill in the next regular session.

Rep. Garry Smith has withdrawn his name as a sponsor of **HB 1266** and Rep. Barbara Nix has taken over as the lead sponsor. We received a draft copy of an amendment to the bill yesterday afternoon. It is being reviewed to see if the impact on workers' comp has been removed.

YESTERDAY AT THE CAPITOL

WORKERS’ COMPENSATION

We received a copy of the agreed bill yesterday and everything appears in order. We will visit with labor today to see if they have any corrections. Then, once we are both satisfied with the bill language, we will ask the sponsor to file the bill.

We confirmed yesterday that the Highway Department was not involved in the filing of **HB 1187** by Rep. Garry Smith. This bill would allow full workers’ compensation benefits for job injuries to persons retired under the State Highway Employees’ Retirement System, in addition to retirement benefits. This bill was filed as a retirement bill, which is not the proper filing. We expect the sponsor to file a new bill that will be a workers’ compensation bill. We object to the elimination of the offset of workers’ comp and retirement benefits and fear it would require all such offsets to be eliminated. In accordance with our agreement with labor, we will jointly oppose this bill and the new bill.

The expected amendment to **HB 1266** by Rep. Garry Smith has not yet been filed. This bill would eliminate the workers’ comp offset for police officers killed or injured in the line of duty. However, this was not Rep. Smith’s intent; he said the provision causing our concern was added by legislative drafting. We are hopeful the amendment will remove the offset provision from the bill. If it does not, then we will jointly oppose the bill with labor in accordance with our agreement.

HB 1314 by Rep. Tommy Baker would authorize municipalities with populations of more than 80,000 in 2000 federal decennial census to provide workers’ compensation coverage for employees and officials. This bill is not troubling, but is outside of our agreement with labor. We are hopeful the Municipal League will agree to hold the bill until 2011 and we will work to get it included in an agreement with labor.

Labor leaders advised us yesterday that they were working with Sen. Joyce Elliott to halt **SB 237**. This is a retirement bill which provides that police officers and firefighters with certain diseases will be presumed to have been injured in the line of duty for disability retirement benefits. Per our agreement with labor, this bill will be opposed by the State Chamber/AIA and the AFL-CIO if it is not withdrawn.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

We are waiting on the Legislative Council to complete a bill that contains the agreement negotiated between the State Chamber/AIA and the AFL-CIO.

We have left a message with the Highway Department to discuss possible amendments to **HB 1187** by Rep. Garry Smith. This bill would allow full workers' compensation benefits for job injuries to persons retired under the State Highway Employees' Retirement System, in addition to retirement benefits. We object to the elimination of the offset of workers' comp and retirement benefits and fear it would require all such offsets to be eliminated. This bill would also fall outside of our agreement with labor.

We visited with Rep. Garry Smith on Friday about **HB 1266**. Our fear was correct that it would eliminate the workers' comp offset for police officers killed or injured in the line of duty. However, this was not Rep. Smith's intent; he said the provision causing our concern was added by legislative drafting. He has an amendment being drawn and we hope to remove the offset provision from the bill.

We have not obtained any additional information about **SB 237** by Sen. Joyce Elliott, which is another retirement bill that provides that police officers and firefighters with certain diseases will be presumed to have been injured in the line of duty for disability retirement benefits. Two years ago, one of labor's issues raised in our negotiations was a desire to have certain diseases presumed to have been caused in the line of duty for firefighters and maybe police officers.

Taxes

One of the priority issues of the State Chamber/AIA is to pass a sales tax exemption for manufacturers' utility costs. Currently, we are holding off on pushing this issue while the legislature deals with the funding options for the trauma system and other healthcare-related issues. Our tax committee has also recommended some other issues for potential legislation. We have met with potential legislative sponsors and leaders of the Department of Finance and Administration to discuss these other issues. We will continue working on these issues while the legislature works on the healthcare funding issue.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

We received a call from Legislative Council advising that they were about finished with the agreed bill that was negotiated between the State Chamber/AIA and the AFL-CIO. Hopefully this bill will be filed very soon.

Meanwhile, we have become concerned about workers' compensation issues showing up in public retirement bills. We wrote yesterday about **HB 1187** by Rep. Garry Smith, which would allow full workers' compensation benefits for job injuries to persons retired under the State Highway Employees' Retirement System, in addition to retirement benefits.

Now we find **HB 1266** also by Rep. Garry Smith. It appears to eliminate the workers' comp offset for police officers killed or injured in the line of duty.

Of even greater concern is **SB 237** by Sen. Joyce Elliott. This is a retirement bill that provides that police officers and firefighters with certain diseases will be presumed to have been injured in the line of duty for disability retirement benefits. Two years ago, one of labor's issues raised in our negotiations was a desire to have certain diseases presumed to have been caused in the line of duty for firefighters and maybe police officers.

Progress was made yesterday in getting the legislative sponsors for the negotiated agreement between the State Chamber/AIA and the AFL-CIO. The agreement will go to legislative drafting today. The agreement contains four parts:

- 1) Clarifies (without making any changes) responsibility for permanent partial disability or permanent total disability claims made on or after January 1, 2008;
- 2) Provides the Contractors Licensing Board authority to revoke a certificate of license of any contractor licensed under Arkansas Code Annotated Section 17-25-308 for failure to maintain workers' compensation coverage;
- 3) authorizes the Commission to move permanent total disability claims currently in the second injury fund to the Death and Permanent Total Disability Trust Fund and authorizes such claims occurring on or after January 1, 2010 to also be paid by the Death and Permanent Total Trust Fund after the employer's responsibility is complete, and
- 4) Cancels the offset provisions for benefits an employee receives from a group policy for disability if the injured worker has paid for the policy.

Meanwhile Rep. Garry Smith has filed **HB 1187**, which would allow full workers' compensation benefits for job injuries to persons retired under the State Highway Employees' Retirement System, in addition to retirement benefits. Part of the agreement between management and labor is that the State Chamber/AIA and the AFL-CIO will jointly oppose all other workers' compensation bills.

SB 33 by Sen. Robert Thompson would remove the prohibition against citing unpublished decisions of the Court of Appeals as precedent. It is on this morning's Senate Judiciary Committee agenda. **SB 33** is a bill we are studying very closely.

HEALTH CARE FUNDING

HB 1204 by Rep. Gregg Reep was filed Monday. It would levy an additional tax on cigarettes of \$28 per thousand cigarettes sold and an additional tax on other tobacco products and soft snuff of 19 percent of the manufacturer's selling price. Yesterday **HB 1238** was filed by Rep. Ed Garner and Sen. Gilbert Baker. It would earmark revenue raised by existing insurance premium taxes to fund the proposed hospital trauma system. These bills have been the subject of much back room discussion and will now take center stage in what is currently one of two top issues active in the session, the other issue being legislation to implement the state lottery. Steve Harrelson has set its consideration as a special order of business next Tuesday. The proposal would make aggravated cruelty to cats, dogs and horses a felony on first offense. This bill was brokered by Attorney General Dustin McDaniel, who worked many months to bring together opposing groups. The State Chamber/AIA joins the Arkansas Farm Bureau, The Poultry Federation, The Cattlemen's Association, the Game & Fish Commission, the Humane Society of the United States, the Pulaski County Humane Society and many others in supporting this bill.

ISSUES

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

The negotiated agreement between the State Chamber/AIA and the AFL-CIO was executed yesterday and copies of the joint statement, signed by Alan Hughes, President of the AFL-CIO, and Kenny Hall, Executive Vice-President of the State Chamber/AIA, were provided to all members of the General Assembly. The agreement contains four parts: 1) clarifies (without making any changes) responsibility for permanent partial disability or permanent total disability claims made on or after January 1, 2008; 2) provides the Contractors Licensing Board authority to revoke a certificate of license of any contractor licensed under Arkansas Code Annotated Section 17-25-308 for failure to maintain workers' compensation coverage; 3) authorizes the commission to move permanent total disability claims currently in the second injury fund to the Death and Permanent Total Disability Trust Fund and authorizes such claims occurring on or after January 1, 2010 to also be paid by the Death and Permanent Total Trust Fund after the employers' responsibility is complete, and 4) cancels the offset provisions for benefits an employee receives from a group policy for disability if the injured worker has paid for the policy.

PACKAGING MATERIALS EXEMPTION

HB 1084 by Rep. Lindsley Smith would limit the use of the sale for resale exemption for packaging materials sold to a manufacturer, to packaging made of biodegradable or recyclable materials. The State Chamber/AIA is opposed to this bill and encourages all members who use this exemption to review the bill and your use of packaging materials. You should also let your legislators know your opinion about the bill. HB 1084 is on the House Revenue and Tax Committee's agenda and will be considered as soon as the Department of Finance and Administration completes a revenue impact statement.

This bill was brokered by Attorney General Dustin McDaniel, who worked many months to bring together opposing groups. The State Chamber/AIA joins the Arkansas Farm Bureau, The Poultry Federation, The Cattlemen's Association, the Game & Fish Commission, the Humane Society of the United States, the Pulaski County Humane Society and many others in supporting this bill.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

The wording of the agreement between Labor and Management that we announced in yesterday's *Daily Update* was reviewed yesterday and we hope to have it signed today or tomorrow. As soon as the document is signed, a copy will be provided to all members of the legislature and a bill will be drafted that contains the content of the agreement.

ANIMAL CRUELTY

SB 77 by Sen. Sue Madison and Rep. Pam Adcock is on the agenda to be considered as a special order of business in the Senate Judiciary committee this morning. SB 77 will make aggravated cruelty to a dog, cat or horse a Class D felony on the first offense. When the bill becomes law, offenders will face a fine of up to \$10,000 and up to six years in prison. The bill also has an enhanced penalty for those who torture animals in the presence of a child. Only certified law enforcement will be allowed to make arrests in animal cruelty cases. SB 77 specifically exempts animal husbandry and other accepted practices. One amendment is expected in the Senate committee.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

The State Chamber/AIA began negotiations with the AFL-CIO last January on workers' compensation issues for this session. We are pleased to announce that an agreement was reached before the first of the year. The wording of the agreement is expected to be finalized this week. As soon as the document is signed, a copy will be provided to all members of the legislature and a bill will be drafted that contains the content of the agreement.

ISSUES

ANIMAL CRUELTY

SB 77 was filed yesterday morning by Sen. Sue Madison and Rep. Pam Adcock. It was filed with 38 co-sponsors in the House and 20 co-sponsors in the Senate. The State Chamber/AIA joined a list of supporters of this bill and we attended a noon press conference hosted by Attorney General Dustin McDaniel, who announced that Governor Beebe had committed his support for the bill. The AG's office had worked for several months with a number of interest groups to craft this compromise bill. The other supporters include: The Poultry Federation, Arkansas Farm Bureau, Arkansas Pork Producers, Arkansas Game & Fish Commission, Arkansas Veterinary Medical Association, Arkansas Prosecuting Attorneys Association, Arkansas Sheriff's Association, Arkansas Association of Chiefs of Police, the Humane Society of the United States, No Chance Arkansas Rescue, All About Labs Rescue, Out of the Woods Rescue, Golden Retrievers Rescue, Pulaski County Humane Society, Saline County Humane Society, Last Chance Arkansas Rescue, Catfish Farmers of Arkansas, Rescue Wrangles and Feline Rescue and Rehome.

SB 77 will make aggravated cruelty to a dog, cat or horse a Class D felony on the first offense. When the bill becomes law, offenders will face a fine of up to \$10,000 and up to six years in prison. The bill also has an enhanced penalty for those who torture animals in the presence of a child. Only certified law enforcement will be allowed to make arrests in animal cruelty cases. SB 77 specifically exempts animal husbandry and other accepted practices.

The bill will run through the House and Senate Judiciary Committees where a majority of both committees are co-sponsors. One amendment is expected in the Senate committee. SB 77 is expected to be considered as a special order of business in the Senate Judiciary committee on Wednesday, January 21.

TECHINICAL UPDATE BILLS

Senator Sue Madison filed 17 bills today (**SB 60 through 76**) that make technical corrections to various code sections. We visited with Senator Madison last night about these bills and she informed us that she is involved in a legislative committee that reviews statutory language and these bills were the result of a series of reviews. She said the bills will not be rushed to consideration and encouraged a close review to make sure no unintended consequences would occur. We have added SB 64—workers' comp, SB 65—environment, SB 68—education, SB 69—utilitites, SB 73—taxes and SB 74—employment to our tracking and will ask our committees to review the bills carefully.

ISSUES

There were some interesting developments yesterday regarding the planned meeting of the **Joint Energy Committee** originally scheduled for this afternoon. The General Assembly website shows the meeting has been rescheduled and the agenda is blank. The Arkansas Legislative Digest service we use to track information about the session still lists the meeting, indicates it has been rescheduled but still contains the list of planned speakers participating in a “Minority Report from the Governor’s Commission on Global Warming.”

The Arkansas News Bureau is reporting that an “unofficial” meeting will occur this afternoon following adjournment of the House and Senate because speakers from out of state are already in town. [Here](#) is a link to the Arkansas News Bureau report.

ISSUES

IMMIGRATION

HB 1093 by Rep. Bill Sample, R-Hot Springs, was filed yesterday. There is concern that the bill is very similar to an Oklahoma law adopted in 2007, which has been the target of a lawsuit supported by Oklahoma business interests. HB 1093 would make certain acts unlawful, authorize state agencies to issue identification documents to certain persons, require the determination of citizenship status for persons charged with certain offenses, require state agencies to participate in a status verification system, require state agencies to verify the lawful presence of persons applying for certain benefits, require withholding of state income tax under certain circumstances, limit benefits for postsecondary education, establish a fraudulent documents identification unit within the department of Arkansas State Police and provide guidelines for resident tuition. The State Chamber/AIA’s policy is that immigration is a federal issue and we encourage the business community to comply with all laws when hiring an employee which includes proper identification and compliance with appropriate anti-discrimination laws. All businesses with an interest in immigration laws should take a close look at this bill right away.

- HB 1045 Ragland Clarifies definition of a disability required to qualify for an income tax credit for supporting a child with a disability; defines permanent total disability as loss of use of both: hands, arms, legs, or eyes.
- HB 1048 Woods Authorizes municipal sewer entities to request termination of water service for customers who are delinquent in paying for solid waste services.
- HB 1053 Greenberg Requires all expenditures of state funds by any office, department, agency, division, bureau, commission or board of the state be maintained in a publicly searchable database.

PRE-FILING UPDATE

Through the close of business on Wednesday, January 8, 2009, 80 bills had been pre-filed by members of the 87th General Assembly. So far, we have placed 45 of the pre-filed bills and resolutions in our tracking system.

As long as bills are filed during the session, we will provide a similar report on a daily basis. All of the bills we track can be accessed on our web site, www.arkansasstatechamber.com, where you may search for bills in a variety of ways. ISSUES OF INTEREST

WORKERS’ COMPENSATION AND UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE UPDATE

The State Chamber/AIA worked throughout 2008 on workers’ compensation and unemployment insurance issues. A series of private negotiations were held with AFL-CIO leaders which resulted in an agreement on workers’ compensation issues. The details of the agreement are currently being finalized. Once finalized, an agreed bill will be drafted and filed. A series of formal negotiations on unemployment insurance issues did not produce an agreement on unemployment insurance issues.

The unemployment insurance issue was limited to trying to solve one problem, a rapidly declining balance in the trust fund that pays unemployment insurance claims. When management and labor could not agree, the Department of Workforce Services staff crafted a proposal to address the declining trust fund balance. The State Chamber/AIA Unemployment Insurance/HR Committee recommended that the proposal be endorsed and the State Chamber/AIA Executive Committee agreed. We expect a bill to be filed without an agreement between management and labor and the State Chamber/AIA will support the bill.

The staff’s plan to shore up the trust fund is to treat employees who quit similar to those who are discharged, change the weekly calculation of benefits from using the highest quarter of earnings to the average of the two highest quarters and implement increases in the taxable wage base by \$500 effective on January 1, 2010 and another \$500 on January 1, 2011. It is our firm belief that it is in the best interest of business to make sure that the trust fund does not run short of funds. If that were to occur, the business community would have to pay the cost of borrowing money – which is going on all over the country.

HB 1037 THE CONSUMER REPORT SECURITY FREEZE ACT, which was pre-filed by Rep. Dawn Creekmore, is a bill that many of you might want to take a look at. It would allow consumers who are not victims of identity theft to place a freeze on consumer reporting, reduce the maximum fee and the time periods allowed for executing or suspending the freeze. We are told this bill is similar to a bill that passed late in the last session but was vetoed by the Governor. Banking, retail and other similar businesses should look closely at this bill, which might be brought up for consideration very early in the session.

STATE CHAMBER/AIA BILL TRACKING

New bills added to State Chamber/AIA tracking:

GOVERNOR BEEBE'S PROPOSED BUDGET

Governor Beebe has released his budget proposals for the next legislative cycle including a modest cut of the grocery tax. The requested one percent reduction would drop the tax to two percent and would be another step toward fulfilling one of the Governor's campaign promises. Some legislators have voiced concern about taking another penny off the sales tax on groceries, a \$30 million cost, given the current state of the economy.

For education, the Governor proposes a 2 percent increase in per-student funding, most of which is derived from growth in local property taxes. The budget does not offer new money for teacher health insurance or school transportation. There is also no new money for higher education for improved retention and graduation rates.

The total price tag for the state budget stands at \$4.5 billion. The budget includes an unfunded appropriation column that includes Medicaid programs, prisons and other state services totaling \$146 million. Beebe's plan is to pay for these unfunded appropriations using part of the projected \$300 million surplus as a "rainy day fund" to cover emergency needs in the budget.

The projections for state revenue have been called conservative by the Governor and the Department of Finance and Administration. Many states are experiencing severe economic troubles and Arkansas is definitely in the minority of states with a surplus. While the Governor is preparing for hard times, he says that the unfunded appropriations will likely be covered by any money above projections. However, if projections stay on target, then part of that funding could come from the "rainy day fund."

Revenue forecasts were based on three scenarios from national forecast providers Global Insight Inc. and Moody's Analytics.

PRE-FILING UPDATE AND STATE CHAMBER/AIA BILL TRACKING

Pre-filing for members of the 87th General Assembly began on Monday, November 17th. As of Friday the 30th, 35 bills had been pre-filed. The House had filed nine bills and the Senate had filed 26 bills. We have placed 22 of the pre-filed bills and resolutions in our tracking system and have pasted the list below.
